Pregnancy can be prevented by taking medicine after a rape or sexual assault.

- \*\*\* Medicine taken after a rape to prevent pregnancy is called emergency contraception (EC).
- EC is a form of birth control. It may delay ovulation, stop fertilization of an egg, or stop a fertilized egg from attaching. 🌋 sccaduasa
- EC does not prevent sexual transmitted diseases.

## Help is Available:

- You do not need to go through this alone. Contact your local rape crisis center to speak with an advocate or call SCCADVASA at 803-256-2900 to be linked with help near you.
- You have rights! Sexual assault is a crime.

## Emergency Contraception is safe and effective.

- EC that is bought without prescription is usually effective up to 3 days after sex. A prescription may be effective longer.
   The sooner it is taken, the better.
- EC is not an abortion. It will not end an existing pregnancy.
- EC can be up to 95% effective in preventing pregnancy.



## You have **options** for Emergency Contraception

- There are several types of EC.
  Plan B is the most common brand used in SC.
- Speak with a doctor/nurse about which type of EC is right for you and about the possible side effects.
- Millions of women have safely taken EC for over 30 years.





- SC law requires health care centers to give victims of rape EC free of charge during a rape exam. The victim must request EC and it must be medically appropriate.
- You do not need to press charges to get EC.
- Speak to an advocate or medical professional for info.



Emergency Contraception is available without age restrictions.

- Some EC pills can be bought at a pharmacy without ID or prescription by males and females of any age.
- EC can be expensive, up to \$60 or more, if not given for free to rape victims in the emergency department.
- Health Departments might also have EC available.
