

#### **Abstract**

- The education of Black male high school students is presently occurring in the context of the #MeToo Movement.
- Recent reports of inappropriate sexual conduct by high profile men, including Black men, has generated heightened awareness, confusion, anxiety, and ambivalence among Black males.
- When identity and interpersonal relationship skills are still relatively early in development, this apparent ambiguity potentially interferes with learning processes that can undermine educational equity for Black males.



#### **Purpose**

To assess the impact of *MY MASCULINITY HELPS* on Black male high school students in reducing rape myth acceptance and affirming active bystander attitudes and behaviors.


### **Method**

#### Design

- Quasi-experimental
- Mixed-methods
  - Item Analysis + Thematic Analysis
- Intervention
  - Film + Discussion
- Pilot study

#### **Participants**


- N=26
- High School Black Males
- 10-12<sup>th</sup> graders
- 16 Different High Schools



#### Instruments

- Updated Illinois Rape Myth Acceptance Scale (UIRMA)
- 20 questions
  - 4 subscales
    - She asked for it
    - He didn't mean to
    - It wasn't really rape
    - She lied
  - Likert Scale (1-5)
    - 1=Strongly Agree

    - 5=Strongly Disagree



Higher scores equals indicate greater rejection of rape myths.

#### Instruments

- Intent to Help Friends Scale (ITHF-Brief)
- 9 questions
- Likert Scale (1-5)
  - 1=Very Unlikely
  - 2=Unlikely
  - 3=Undecided
  - 4=Likely
  - 5=Very Likely



 If a girl/woman is raped while she is drunk, she is at least somewhat responsible for letting things get out of hand.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -3.14
(M= <b>3.3</b> , SD=1.049)	(M= <b>4.1</b> , SD=1.017)	p = .004

 When boys/men rape, it is usually because of their strong desire for sex.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -2.61
(M= <b>2.5</b> , SD=1.106)	(M= <b>4.2</b> , SD=1.327)	p = .015

 Boys/men don't usually intend to force sex on a girl/woman, but sometimes they get too sexually carried away.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -2.90
(M= <b>2.6</b> , SD=.956)	(M= <b>3.5</b> , SD=1.240)	<i>p</i> = .008

Rape happen when a guy's sex drive goes out of control.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -2.82
(M= <b>2.6</b> , SD=1.000)	(M= <b>3.4</b> , SD=1.416)	p = .009

If both people are drunk, it can't be rape.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -2.82
(M= <b>3.3</b> , SD=1.295)	(M= <b>4.2</b> , SD=1.096)	p = .021

If a girl/woman doesn't say "no" she can't claim rape.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = -2.39
(M= <b>3.3</b> , SD=1.237)	(M= <b>4.1</b> , SD=1.033)	p = .025

 A lot of times, girls/women who say they were raped often led the guy on and then had regrets.

Pretest	Posttest	t (25) = 3.757
(M= <b>2.68</b> , SD=.862)	(M= <b>3.5</b> , SD=.906)	p = .001

# Findings: Intent to Help Friends

 I approach someone I know if I thought they were in an abusive relationship and let them know I'm here to help.

Pretest	Posttest	t (24) = -2.32
(M= <b>4.3</b> , SD=.775)	(M= <b>4.7</b> , SD=.557)	p = .03

 If some said they had an unwanted sexual experience, but don't call it rape, I express concern and offer to help.

Pretest	Posttest	t (24) = -3.00
(M= <b>4.1</b> , SD=.997)	(M= <b>4.7</b> , SD=.557)	p = .006

# Findings: Intent to Help Friends

 I stop and check in on someone who looks intoxicated when they are being taken upstairs at a party.

Pretest	Posttest	t (24) = -3.87
(M= <b>3.5</b> , SD=1.189)	(M= <b>4.5</b> , SD=.714)	<i>p</i> = .001

## Describe how MMH affected you.

- It opened my eyes to sexual assault. I never really felt as bad as I should about rape until now. [Empathy]
- It helped me think before I do things, and look out for others that might be going through something.
   [Empathy]
- It has made me rethink experiences and conversations that I have had with people that could have been hints to sexual assault. [Empathy]
- It brought to my attention the importance a male perspective and involvement is in a woman's life especially if they have been a victim of sexual assault.
   [Male Engagement]

# **Explain what you learned from MMH**

- ...rape victims don't have it easy [Empathy]
- Most men actually want to intervene when those around them tell sexist or misogynistic jokes
   [Awareness]
- That if two people are drunk, it can still be rape [Awareness].
- ...you should step up and take action when you hear a person talking about a woman in the wrong way!![Male Engagement]
- ...under no circumstances where **consent** is not given is anything [sexual] ok to do. [Awareness]
- ...large amount of women who are sexually harassed [Awareness]

# What will you do now that you have seen MMH?

- Make sure others are safe and make sure I'm not one of the reasons of this problem.
- Try to help someone out when they are going though tough times and needs someone they can trust and could talk to without feeling in danger or uncomfortable.
- Respect women.
- Speak up when I see something wrong and reach out to my friends.
- Help others and carry myself better around females and how I talk about them.
